### Story: The Lost Sheep Luke 10

#### Lesson Intro:

Show the children the box of dinosaurs (or toys).

Tell them that they get all of these to play with.

Ask: What if I told you that there was one missing. How would you feel?

Ask: Should we look for the missing dinosaur or just play with the ones we have?

#### <u>Lesson</u>

Active Listening: Today we are going to hear a story from Jesus about a shepherd that has a lamb that gets lost. Let's see what he does.

- 1. Read "The Sheep" on page 412 417 of <u>The Beginners Bible</u>.
  - As you read, ask children about each page.

After reading- discuss what happened in the story.

#### 2. Review the Story

- 1. Pass out the review Worksheet to each child.
- 2. Read each question out loud. Have the children circle the correct answer.

**Prayer:** Please pause after every few words to allow the children to repeat the prayer.

## Materials:

- Lambs
- Bible story

## **Directions:**

- 1. Use the lambs to retell the story.
- 2. When you get to the part in the story where there is a lost sheep, have the teacher or select one child to hide one of the lambs around the room.
- 3. Select another child or teacher to search or the missing lamb.

Repeat as many times as children would like.

## Activity: Sheep Game

## Materials:

- Vaseline
- Cotton Balls
- Picture of sheep

# **Directions:**

# Option 1:

- 1. Put a little Vaseline on each child's nose.
- 2. Let children how many cotton balls they can get stuck on their face and nose in the allotted time that the teacher gives them. (10 seconds...)

# Option 2:

- 1. Place the picture of the lamb on one wall.
- 2. Place a little Vaseline on the picture of the lamb.
- 3. Place a box of cotton balls on the opposite wall of the lamb picture.
- 4. Have the children take turns walking back and forth from the cotton balls to the lamb.
- 5. See how many cotton balls they can get to stick.


## Activity: Cotton Ball Sheep


### Materials:


- Sheep Outline
- Glue
- Markers/crayons

## **Directions:**

- 1. Give each child an outline of a sheep or the older children could draw a sheep on their own.
- 2. Glue pieces of cotton on their sheep.
- 3. Children can then use markers to draw grass, sky, sun, etc and write JESUS NEVER GIVES UP ON A LOST SHEEP.












