Maundy Thursday Worship Service

Grace Lutheran Church 6 pm April 6, 2023

As We Gather:

"Maundy" comes from a Latin word meeting "mandate." This day commemorates Christ's institution of the Lord's Supper and His mandates that we do this in remembrance of Him – and also lovingly serve one another.

Tonight's service is drawn from the Corporate Confession and Absolution and Divine Service Setting 3 in the LSB hymnal. The service concludes with the **Stripping of the Altar** – to prepare our chancel and hearts for the starkness and darkness of Good Friday.

This year during Lent we have meditated on the ways of the Kingdom of God, as Jesus teaches and demonstrates them. Tonight we see and taste that Kingdom now and not yet in the Holy Supper of Christ's body and blood.

Welcome:

Opening Hymn: "Jesus, I Will Ponder Now" (LSB # 440, st. 1,3,5)

- 1. Jesus, I will ponder now On Your holy passion; With Your Spirit me endow For such meditation. Grant that I in love and faith May the image cherish Of Your suff'ring, pain, and death That I may not perish.
- **3.** Yet, O Lord, not thus alone Make me see Your passion, But its cause to me make known And its termination. Ah! I also and my sin Wrought Your deep affliction; This indeed the cause has been Of Your crucifixion.
- **5.** If my sins give me alarm And my conscience grieve me, Let Your cross my fear disarm; Peace of conscience give me. Help me see forgiveness won By Your holy passion. If for me He slays His Son, God must have compassion!

Corporate Confession and Absolution: (LSB p. 290-291)

Old Testament Reading: Jeremiah 31:31-34

"Behold, the days are coming, declares the LORD, when I will make a new covenant with the house of Israel and the house of Judah, not like the covenant that I made with their fathers on the day when I took them by the hand to bring them out of the land of Egypt, my covenant that they broke, though I was their husband, declares the LORD. For I will write it on their hearts. And I will be their God, and they shall be my people. And no longer shall each one teach his neighbor and each his brother, saying, 'Know the LORD,' for they shall all know me, from the least of them to the greatest, declares the LORD. For I will forgive their iniquity, and I will remember their sin no more."

Gospel Reading: Matthew 26:17-29

In Now on the first day of Unleavened Bread the disciples came to Jesus, saying, "Where will you have us prepare for you to eat the Passover?" He said, "Go into the city to a certain man and say to him, "The Teacher says, My time is at hand. I will keep the Passover at your house with my disciples." And the disciples did as Jesus had directed them, and they prepared the Passover.

²⁰ When it was evening, he reclined at table with the twelve. ²¹ And as they were eating, he said, "Truly, I say to you, one of you will betray me." ²² And they were very sorrowful and began to say to him one after another, "Is it I, Lord?" ²³ He answered, "He who has dipped his hand in the dish with me will betray me. ²⁴ The Son of Man goes as it is written of him, but woe to that man by whom the Son of Man is betrayed! It would have been better for that man if he had not been born." ²⁵ Judas, who would betray him, answered, "Is it I, Rabbi?" He said to him, "You have said so."

²⁶ Now as they were eating, Jesus took bread, and after blessing it broke it and gave it to the disciples, and said, "Take, eat; this is my body." And he took a cup, and when he had given thanks he gave it to them, saying, "Drink of it, all of you, ²⁸ for this is my blood of the covenant, which is poured out for many for the forgiveness of sins. ²⁹ I tell you I will not drink again of this fruit of the vine until that day when I drink it new with you in my Father's kingdom."

Stripping of the Altar:

The Pastor and altar guild members now strip the altar and clear the chancel area of all paraments and furnishings. This is to symbolize the extent of Christ's service on behalf of others – as He was stripped of His clothes, dignity, and then very life. This prepares the church, and our hearts, for the solemn service of Good Friday.

Meanwhile, the congregation sings hymn # 420 "Christ, the Life of All the Living," its words and melody leading us to fuller meditation on the suffering of Christ and our faithful response.

Tonight's service ends without a Benediction, because the worship of our Lord continues tomorrow night in that worship service remembering His death on the cross. The congregation exits the sanctuary tonight following the Pastor.
